

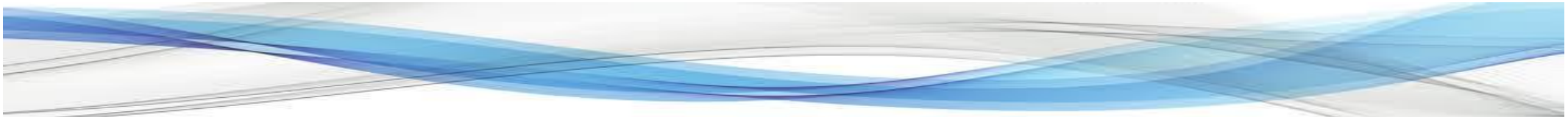

However, please know that I put together this slide show document myself and any errors or omissions are mine alone.



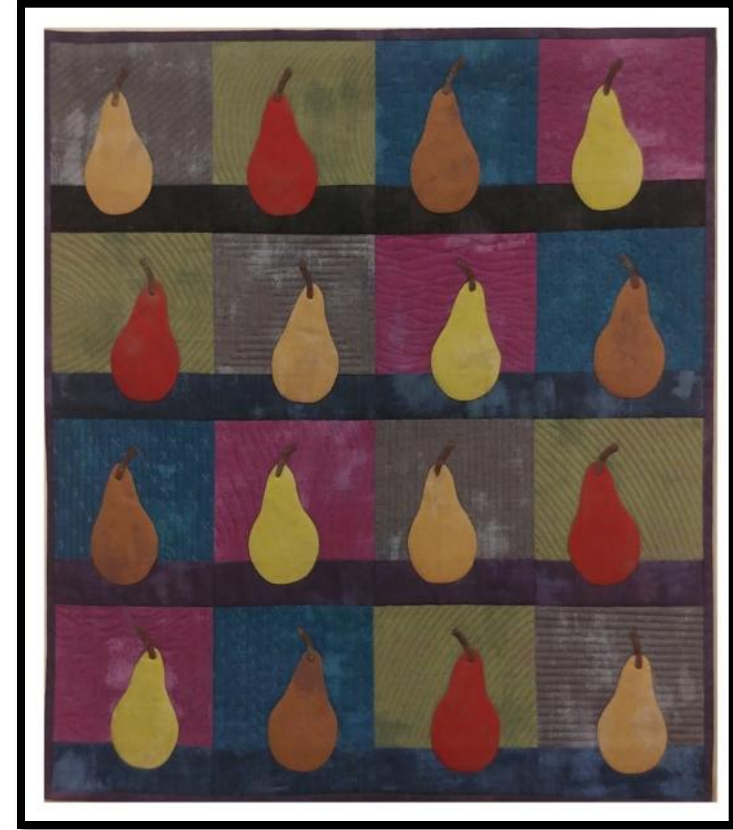

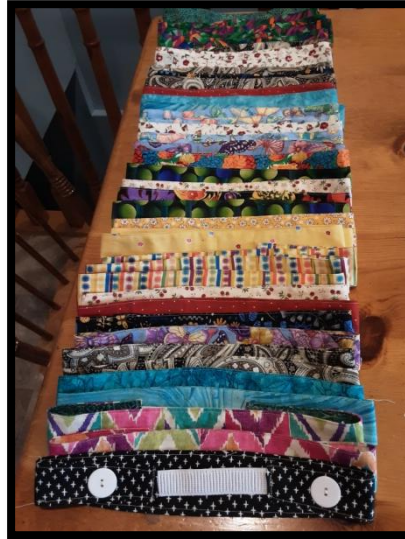

This quilt is called Courtyard Steps from Missouri Star, that we did as a retreat suggestion in Port Huron.

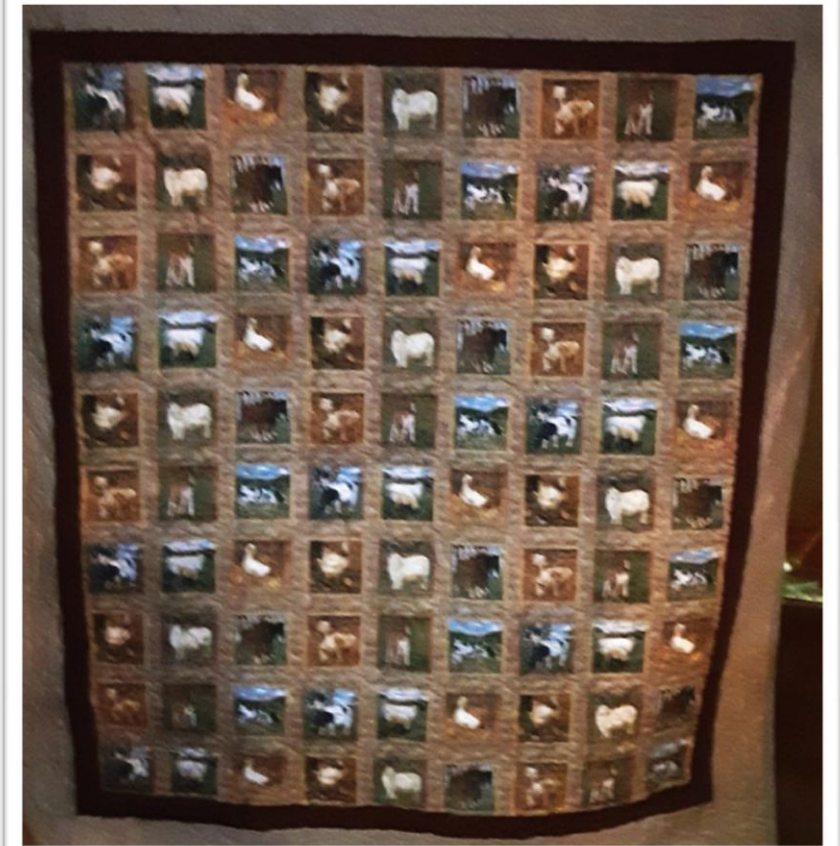

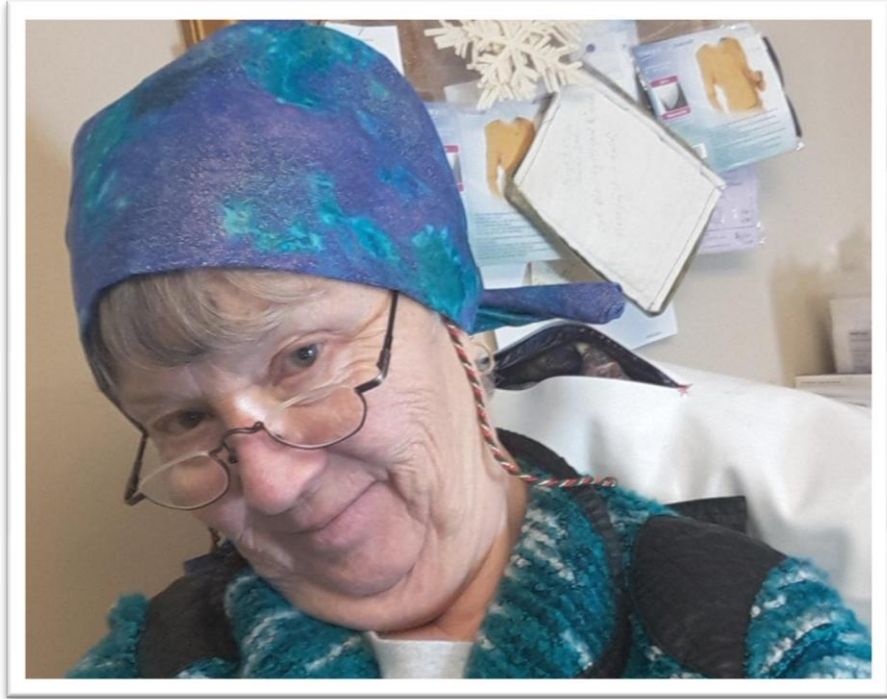

They were so much fun to make.



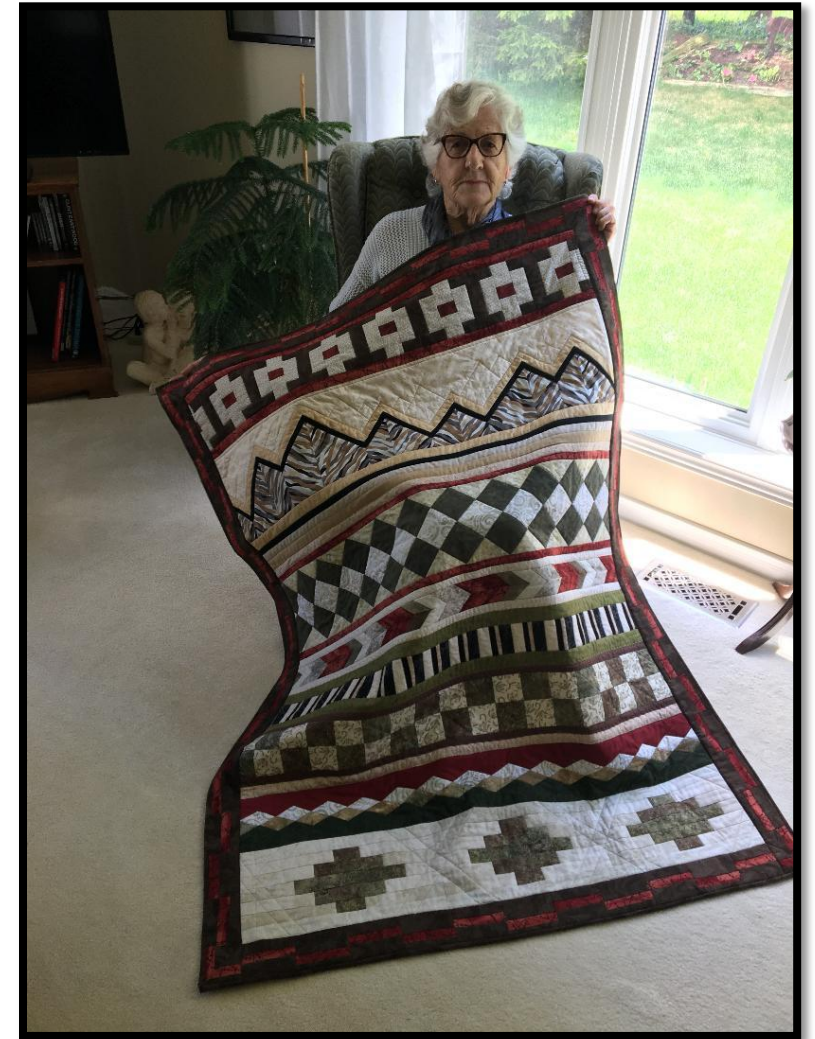

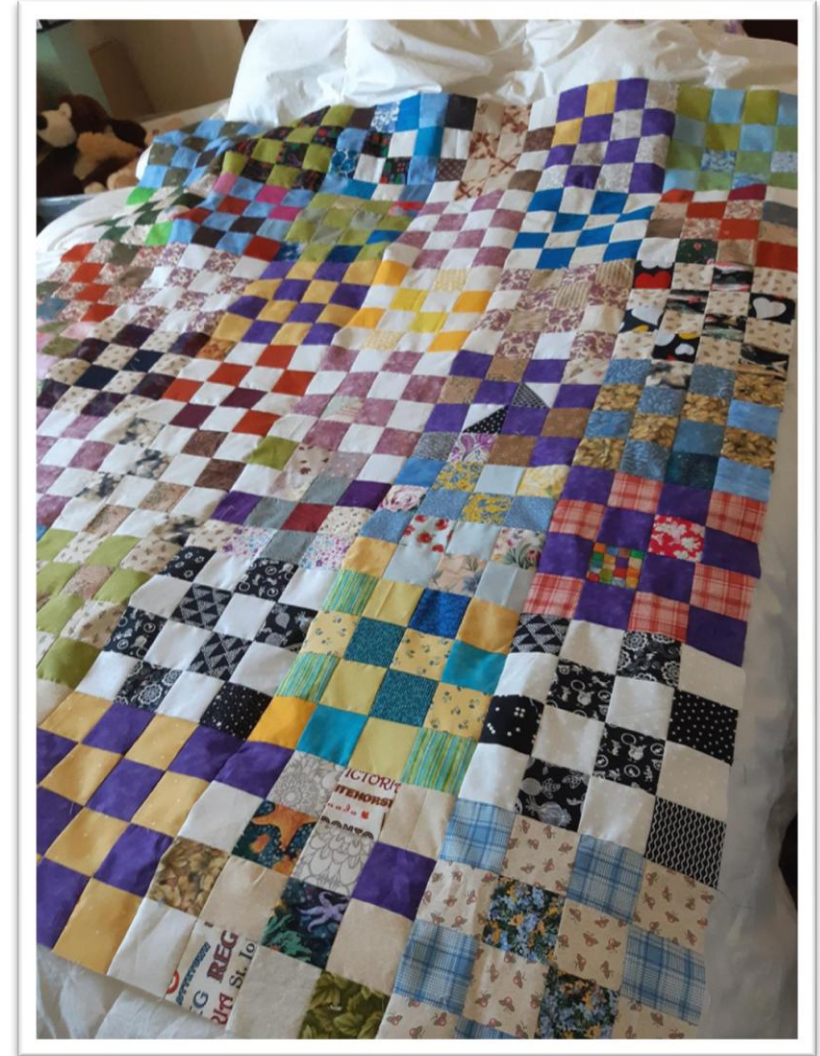

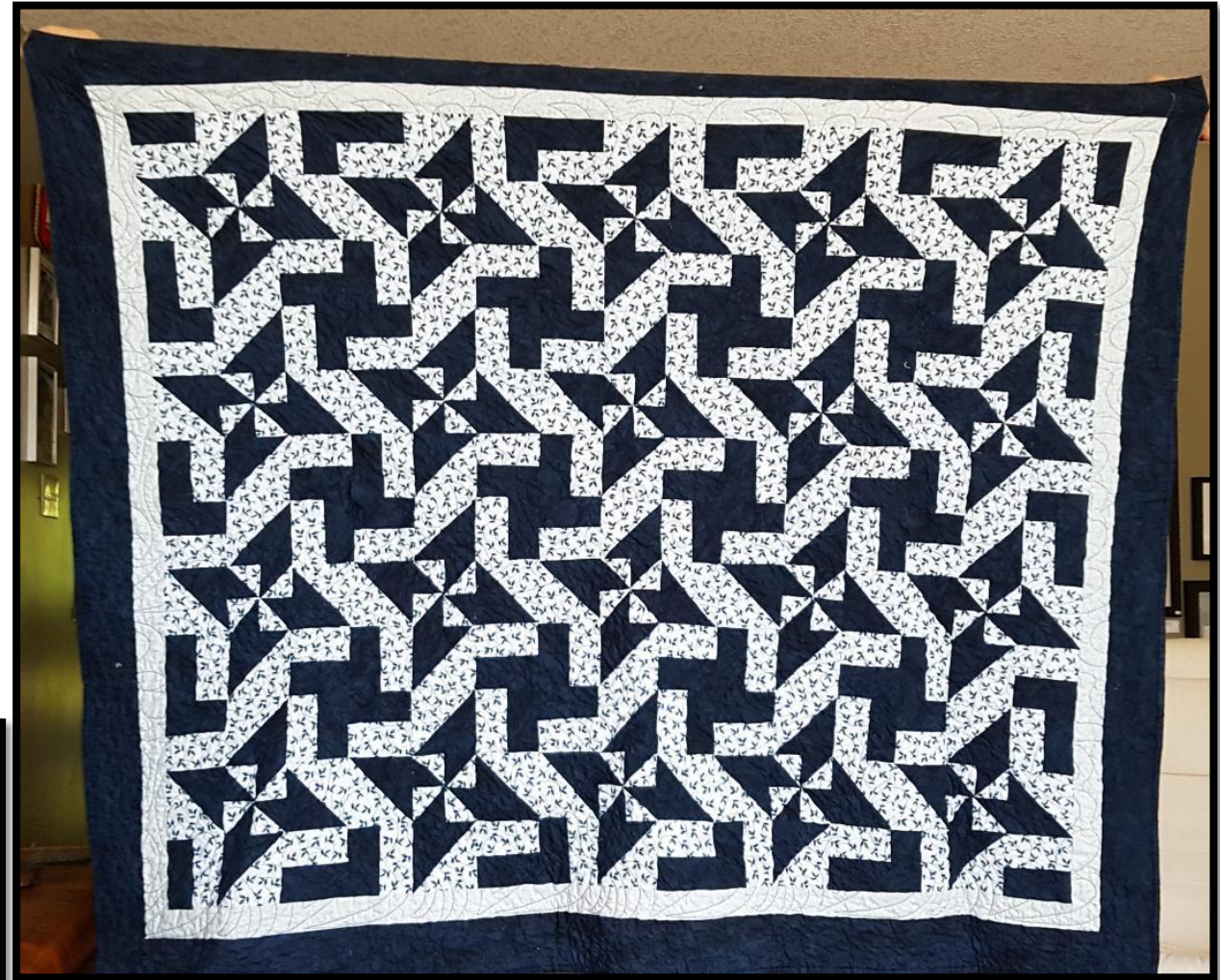

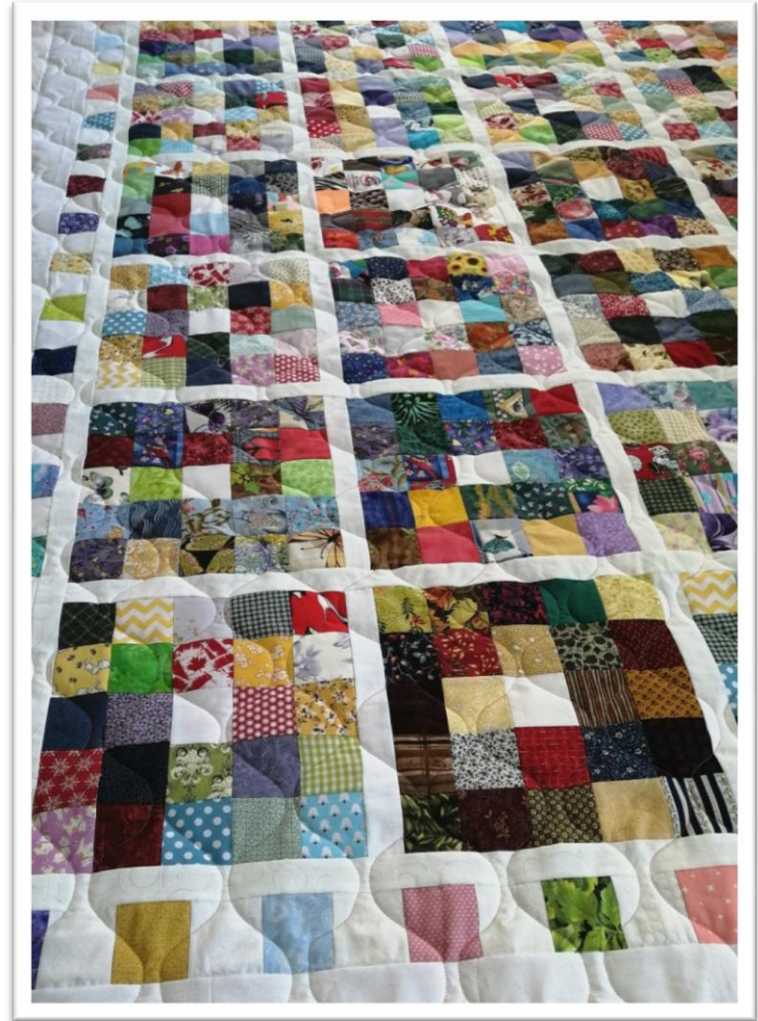

Hi and thank you for organizing this! I am looking forward to seeing what everyone has been busy creating! I always love show and tell time!

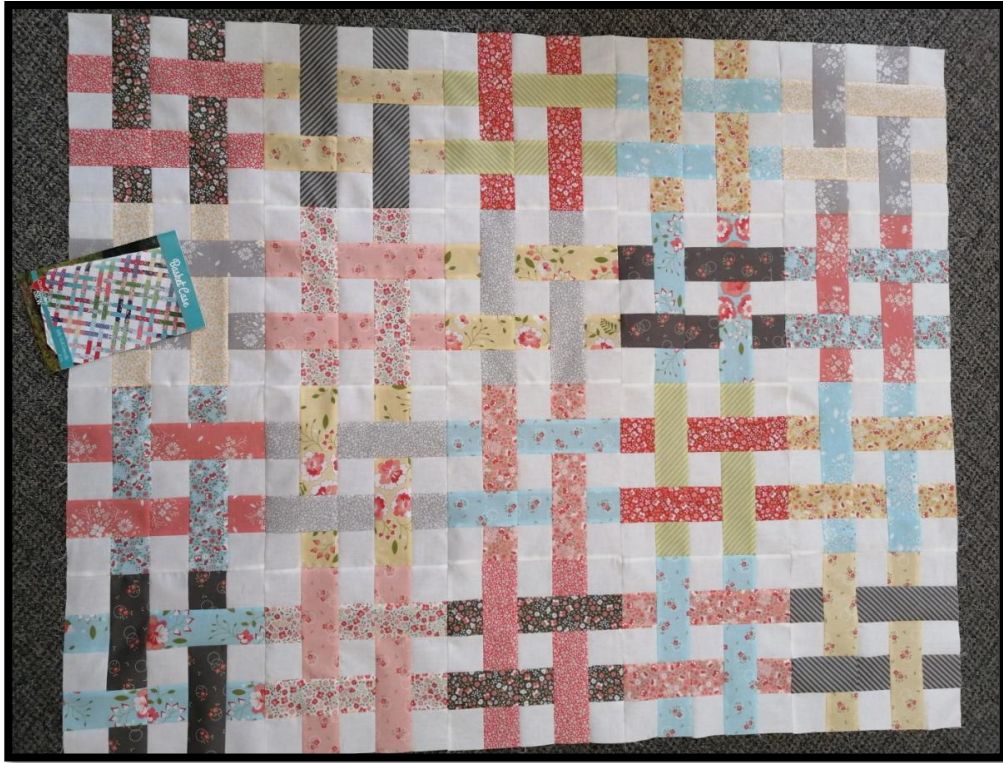


The red and white quilt I pieced during our lockdown in honour of all of our first responders. The pattern is called Swiss Kiss by Jedi Craft Girl.

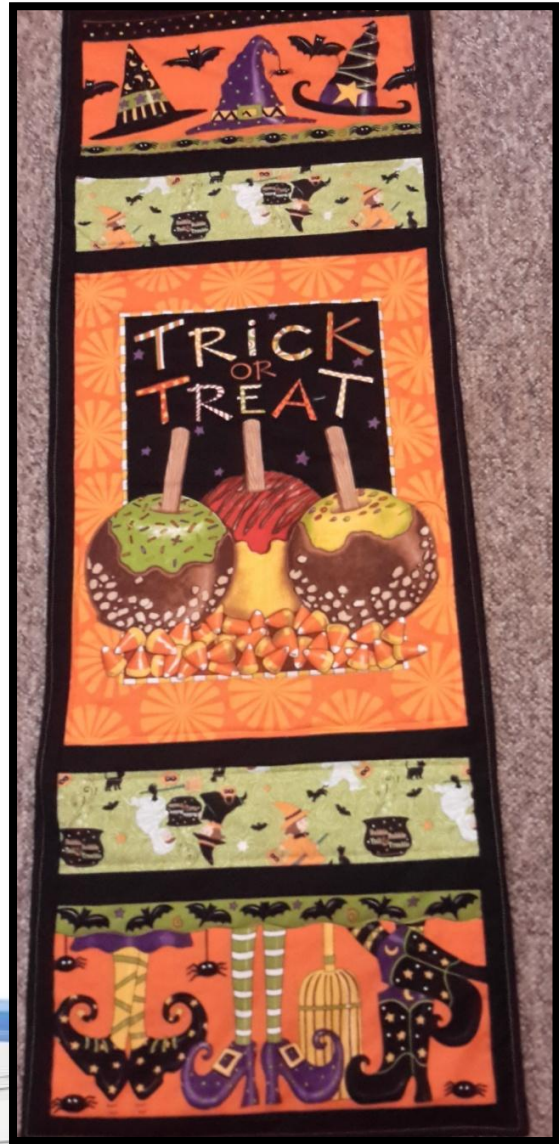

This turquoise quilt was made for the couple looking after us, and doing our shopping to keep us out of stores during this trying time.

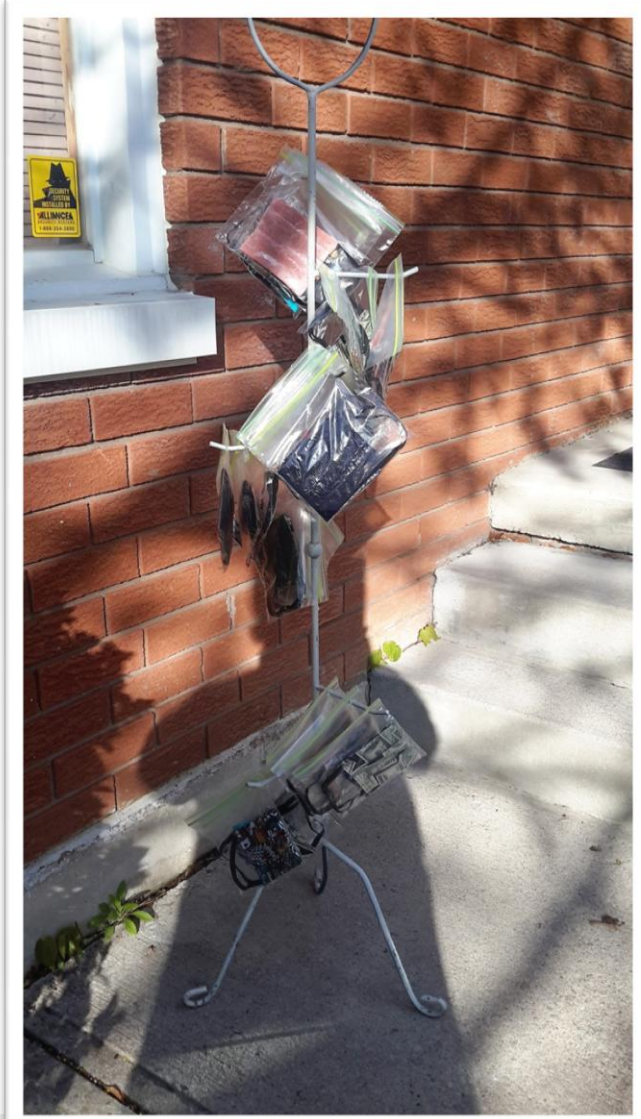
