
THE GRAND QUILT GUILD

ROW BY ROW PROJECT 2024 – 2025

BLOCK #2 OCTOBER 9, 2024

DUE NOVEMBER 13, 2024

SNAIL TRAIL



Instructions are for 1 block

MATERIALS:

Two fabrics, 1 light and 1 dark (contrasting)

This is a 6 ½ inch unfished block

CUT:

Light: 2 x 1 ¾ inch square

1 x $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch square (cut diagonally in half)

1 x 3 ¼ inch square (cut diagonally in hal)

1 x 4 inch square (cut diagonally in half)

Dark 2 x 1 ¾ inch square

1 x 2 ½ inch square (cut diagonally in half)

1 x 3 ¼ inch square (cut diagonally in hal)

1 x 4 inch square (cut diagonally in half)

ASSEMBLE:

1 Make a four patch with the two dark and two light 1 3/4 inch squares


Press the seams towards the dark

Trim the block to 2 3/4 inches

- it is critical that the block measure 2 ¾ inches (if not this will affect the finished size)
- Now sew a dark 2 ½ inch half square triangle to opposite sides of the four patch
 - take care to center the triangle on the four patch


Then sew a light 2 ½ inch half square triangle to the other sides of the four patch

It is critical to now trim this block to 3 ½ inches



Now sew a dark 3 ¼ inch dark half square triangle to opposing sides of this block taking care to center the triangle on the block.

Now follow this with the two 3 1/4 inch light triangles to remaining opposing sides



• again it is critical that the block be trimmed to 4 3/4 inches

4 Now add the last set of 4 inch dark and light triangles to this block

Taking care to center the triangles on the block

Trim this block to 6 ½ inches



Now that you have mastered this one make 6 more.

This block can be made bigger by simply adding more half square triangle

This block has several names and variations.

In the 1920s it was called a Monkey Wrench.

Quilters Newsletter called it Indiana Puzzle in 1976.

Other names have been Journey to California and Whirligig Quilt.

One of the hardest things in quilting is obtaining and maintaining a consistent ¼ inch seam.

You can easily check your accuracy by- the following:

- cut three strips 1 ½ inches by 3 inches
- stitch the three strips together (longwise) to make a
 - 3 ½ inch square
- press the seams towards the outside
- measure the center strip it should measure 1 inch
- if less than 1 inch your ¼ inch is too big
- if more than 1 inch your ¼ inch is too small
